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CYMBIDIUM CULTURE NOTES /FEBRUARY/MARCH 2009) by Roy Brown.

The next month or two are the most important ones for the successful flowering of Cymbidiums. The new growths must be kept growing so they will bulb up in time to produce their flower spikes. To do this they will need as much light as they can take without actual burning of the leaves, plenty of fertiliser and water.

During the next two months we can expect continuing high temperatures, and accompanied with this, hot dry easterly winds. See that your cymbidiums receive an ample supply of water; water at least twice day. We must try to create as much humidity as possible during the summer months if we are to grow Cymbidiums with any success at all. When watering your plants, use a fine mist spray and leave it on long enough to thoroughly saturate the compost in the pots and surroundings.

This is the time of the year when young flower spikes are starting to develop and a drop in temperature during the evenings is vital for the successful flowering of Cymbids. If we use the overhead sprinklers in the evening this will bring the temperature down quite a few degrees and will create ideal growing conditions.

during March we see the first signs of flower spikes. Be very careful when handling these plants, the spikes will be very brittle and damage easily. With the advent of flower spikes, it might be a good idea to give the shade-house a clean up. Get rid of all dead leaves, weeds and anything else that could harbour pests.

Make sure you have a supply of pots and compost ready for those repotting jobs that can be started in the Autumn.

CATTLEYA CULTURE NOTES (FEBRUARY/MARCH 2009) by Henry Eaton.

the weather has, as expected, been hot, excessively so at times and is likely to be the same in this period. As such, the aims of culture are to keep your plants well hydrated and as cool as possible. This means regular watering without getting the mix soggy. A little drying out between watering is acceptable and will be appreciated by the mature plants. Do not allow seedlings to dry out completely as this may set them back. Avoid any potting at this time. Continue your fertiliser programme but try on any days forecast to be cooler than 30-35C if possible. If the days are very hot, especially if in the high 30's or 40's give consideration to watering your plants in the late afternoon or evening to cool everything down. This will also increase the humidity. Increase the shading if necessary. Sometimes removing the shade cloth on the shadiest side of the growing area, or raising the lower border off the ground, helps in letting in more air and cooling the place down.

Keep a lookout for flowering sheaths and flower buds breaking through so that they can be separated from those areas which are being watered most. This helps to stop water collecting in an open flower sheath, leading to rotting off of the buds.

Bill Murdoch

Every year in our Show Schedules (usually Spring) we find a prize called The Bill Murdoch Trophy. This is an award which can be nominated for by the owner of an Australian Native Species should it win Best Australian Native Species in the show. The nomination can be forwarded to be considered for the Bill Murdoch Trophy. Most are aware of this award but how many of us know anything of the man this trophy honours?

Bill Murdoch was born in 1895. The Defence Act of 1905 decreed all males liable to perform National Service, firstly as cadets from 16-18 years of age, then in the militia. Bill began as a cadet in 1911 then after two years transferred to the militia. When WW1 broke out in 1914, he enlisted

in the A.I.F in on 2nd February 1915. In May he embarked on the "Thermistocles" for Suez, then on to Gallipoli on the "Alaunia". After having served here, he was transferred back to Australia

dangerously ill. As soon as possible he was off again, this time to France where he saw service in the Somme Valley. He was wounded here and evacuated to England. After recovery form his wounds, he went back to France in 1918 where the war finally ended.

He remained an Anzac, like his mates, and resumed military training back home with the drill hall being his responsibility. In 1939, when the 2nd World War came around, he was ready to go off to fight Hitler. He was appointed "Voyage Officer" only in the "Aquitania" from Bombay in 1941, but stayed on military service back home for the duration, retiring with the rank of Lieutenant –

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Colonel. Purchasing land at Coal Point, Lake Macquarie, Bill built his home there. A conservationist all his life but very much resented anyone calling him a "greenie", he was just a genuine carer for the environment. He had a deep and abiding love for nature, not only on the land he owned, but any he saw wherever he went. He loved all plants, but was not a collector of any particular ones until he encountered native orchids. He loved to talk about, know and protect all plants should they need it, but native orchids came above all. Their desperate need for survival and what he did about it, became part of his legacy to his country. This was the certainty that one whole plant family would survive for evermore. Because of his dedication (along with hundreds of other dedicated people) and years of continuous work, a new industry was developed in Australia. Small at first but now over the \$1m. a year mark, Australian native species and the exquisite hybrids that have been developed, are making a big impression in the multibillion dollar world orchid industry. They are now exported to America. Europe and Japan and

billion dollar world orchid industry. They are now exported to America, Europe and Japan and still building up. In the late fifties, he was worried about the careless, mindless destruction of the native orchids by commercial logging and indiscriminate collecting by local entrepreneurs.

In 1963, with three other enthusiastic friends, he formed the Australasian Native Orchid Society (ANOS), dedicated to the conservation and study of all orchid species occurring in the Commonwealth of Australia and it's Territories, New Zealand, PNG and all Pacific Islands east of Australia to the International Date Line and south of the equator. In addition, all hybrids whose parentage came from anywhere in this huge designated area. Bill Murdoch, at his own expense, toured throughout Australia, speaking on native orchids and encouraging people to form ANOS groups. The next step was a Society Journal which was called the Orchadian. A quarterly publication it is the only one in Australia which concentrates solely on our own native species, and on these grounds cannot be equalled world-wide. A young 68 when he started this Society, he watched with pride the increasing awareness of conservation and the developing hybrid industry.

Bill Murdoch passed away on 24th July 1989 at the age of 94, regrettably too soon to see his legacy to Australia reach the world wide recognition that it enjoys today.
