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CYMBIDIUM CULTURE NOTES (FEBRUARY/MARCH 2010) by Roy Brown

These are hot months with the temperature in the high 30's, so regular use of the overhead sprinklers are an absolute must. Create as much humidity as possible, keep the pots and the area around your shade house plants as damp as possible.

It's my opinion the next month or two are the most important ones for the successful flowering of Cymbidiums. The new growths must be kept moving, so they will bulb up in time to produce their spikes. To do this will need as much light as they can take without burning of the leaves, plenty of fertiliser and water.

For those who grow their plants under 50% Sarlon Shade Cloth you will find the plants leaves have become a yellowy green colour, this is mainly because of the bright light we experience here in WA, the skies being cloudless during the summer months. Provided the bulbs are nice and plump and the plants are healthy, this yellowing is a good sign that your plants could flower this season. A plant grown under too heavy shade conditions will have a dark green, lush foliage and will not produce as many flower spikes as one that has been grown under bright sunlight.

Give your plants a good spraying with an insecticide to keep them free from red spider, thrips, scale etc. It's during the next couple of months that the flower spikes are produced and it is a good idea to have the plants free from all insects well in advance, so that no harm comes to the young flower spikes as they show up.

CATTLEYA CULTURE NOTES (FEBRUARY/MARCH 2010) by Henry Eaton

February and March are usually the hottest months for us in the West. This means keeping up with cultural practices employed in the Summer, mainly shading the plants and providing sufficient moisture and fertiliser to them. Beware though, that Cattleyas by and large, benefit by alternating dry and wet periods. This means not watering them, unless loss of weight of the potted plant indicates that water is needed. I was reminded of this when I had to repot a plant, growing out of a pot in many spots, recently. Although previously potted in bark of large size, the mix was wet through from the watering it had the day before. When a plant is growing over the edge of a pot, another technique to use is to place another pot full of mix under the overgrowth, so that roots can establish there before repotting in Autumn or Spring.

At this time also begin to look for flowering sheaths or buds appearing on mature new growths. When spotted, move them into an area free of pests and away from water dripping on them. If moved, make sure the buds point in the same direction they were in before you moved them. Many autumn flowering plants will now begin showing buds and sheaths, so be on the lookout for them.

Evening's Programme: Forum about watering

January Meeting Item - Forum about Watering

Ross Lang opened the proceedings talking about his experiments with a new type of pot. He is experimenting with pots having no holes at the bottom, but a few holes in the sides, 30 mm from base and higher. The position of the holes keeps a 30 mm deep reserve of water in the bottom of the pot. The water rises up the potting medium (eg expanded clay) to keep the roots moist, and the reservoir allows for less frequent watering than with standard pots. For large plants, 9 litre buckets can be turned into inexpensive pots by appropriately -drilled holes. Ross also showed samples of some synthetic media - expanded clay, Perlite and Fytocell. Fytocell

(available from Hydroponic Solutions in Balcatta) soaks up a lot of water but retains air in 60% of its pores, and is proving good for Ross's small Cymbidiums. Ross warned of the risk of using cheap plastic clips to hold black 13 mm pipe onto barbed tees etc. in irrigation systems. The plastic clips break easily, especially after they've been in place for a year or so, and he recommends metal hose clamps instead. He also warned of poorly designed 13 mm barbed taps that can be used with watering systems - certain poorly designed taps are liable to be blown apart if the water pressure is high. Ross showed a type of misting unit (made by Netafim and available fro Total Eden or Watershed Water systems) which he uses for short periods about 5 times a day to keep the orchid environment humid and cool.
