### CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (MARCH/APRIL 2010) by Roy Brown

March and April bring in the change of seasons from Summer to Autumn. However we still have plenty of hot days ahead of us, although by the middle of April the weather pattern should change and become more suitable for Cymbidiums.

It's during the Autumn that a start can be made on re-potting our plants. Take care when dividing and re-potting; it isn't very easy untangling the mass of roots the plants develop, but if care is taken the new division will suffer very little set-back when repotted. The Cymbidiums roots are very active now and the plant will become quickly established in the new compost.

The early flowering plants are now producing their flower spikes and these should become more apparent each day. These early spikes grow very quickly and most will be in flower by June/July.

A regular fertilising programme can still be continued, and if you like, a little extra Potash can be added. This will give the young spikes an added boost. The weather pattern is still for warm days but cooler nights, so give the shade house at least one good watering a day, preferably in the mornings.

### CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (MARCH/APRIL 2010) by Henry Eaton

Although March is technically the first month of Autumn, we can still expect days when the temperature goes quite high and there is little, if any, rain around to increase the humidity. The light may be decreasing slightly, but the heat still requires that you maintain shading as for the Summer months. Watering and fertilising your plants will still follow a summer pattern, unless there is rain when you can miss a watering if needed. Cattleyas are plants that revel in a wet/dry cycle, where they like to dry out nearly fully before being watered again. You can gauge this by lifting up the pot after watering when it should feel heavy. The pot loses weight when drying out, giving you the signal to re-water.

At this time of the year, due to the cooler nights, check your plants after watering to make sure no water has collected in between the upper leaves. This is essential, as at this time many plants will be producing flowering sheaths and buds, and water remaining around them could cause rotting. If water has collected dry it up with a tissue. While attending to your plants, also stake the pseudo bulbs bearing the buds or flower sheaths erect, so that when the flowers emerge they will be pointing towards you and not every which way.

If you have a flowering house out of the rain etc., make sure that the plant is pointing in the same direction as which it was grown, as otherwise the buds may open in an unsightly fashion.

Remember you can purchase your orchid supplies from the Opportunity Table at each General Meeting.

### Forum about Watering continued

Murray showed off various watering devices he has used, from cheap spray attachments that fit on plastic drink bottles to not-so-cheap but robust 8L Hozelock pump sprayers (both from Bunnings). The Hozelock sprayer is about the right size for a batch of fertiliser solution for his collection, while a 1L soft drink bottle fitted with a spray attachment is a convenient size for a batch of insecticide to treat a small outbreak of scale. Murray uses a 13 mm black pipe system fitted with "Microjet Mistspray" heads (which produce spray rather than mist) to water his orchids when he doesn't have time to water by hand. Murray also had a couple of misting fittings to show: a simple black mister unit (from Watering Concepts, Belmont) that Rosemary McGrath said was prone to blockage from salts, and the Netafim type of misting unit used by Ross Lang (and Malcolm Davis) which can be dismantled for cleaning. Malcolm spoke of the benefit of having an anti-drip device in this type of mister (to prevent water from the pipes dripping onto the orchid directly under the mister for hours after the mister is turned off). Malcolm and tom Dixon stressed the importance of having misters pointing horizontally to cover a large area rather than pointing downwards (where they will only cover the plants directly below unless there is wind movement to blow the mist around)

Bob Jones told us about his electrical pump with 63L reservoir on wheels. The pump feeds water (or fertiliser solution etc) into a high pressure hose with a fitting that produces a fine spray, and 3L does his whole collection. The kit cost \$25 at a garage sale!.....to be concluded next issue.

### **Popular Vote winners in February**

Novice: C. Lulu "Pink Blush', grower Merrilyn Brechin who grows it under 50% shade cloth, with an extra layer of 50% shade cloth in summer to keep the plant from getting too hot. Fertilising is weekly or fortnightly with 'lonic' and watering is daily during summer (twice daily on extra hot days). During winter the plant receives the winter rain. The plant has many roots growing outside the pot and is due for repotting after flowering is finished.

Open: Phragmipedium Geralda, grower Maxine Godbeer who obtained this plant from Nicky Zurcher (South Australia) many years ago and this was the first flowering. It is a hybrid of *Phrag. caudatum* and *Phrag. lindleyanum.* The long petals are a trait derived from the *caudatum* parent. The plant is grown in coconut fibre, the pot standing on a layer of blue-metal in the lid of a polystyrene box. Water pools in the lid and creates humidity and the metal keeps the pot elevated so it isn't soaking in the water. It is grown in a hothouse where the extra humidity helps to keep the long thin petals from drying out. Fertilised once a week & given a good flush through about every third time. It flowers progressively (new flowers open on the raceme as older ones die off) & can flower on the same raceme for a long time.
