CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (APRIL/MAY 2012) by Roy Brown

Hopefully the hot, dry weather should be behind us and we can look forward to a weather pattern more suited to growing Cymbidiums. We will have to adjust the watering to suit the needs of the day now on. Unless we have rain, watering will be needed once a day, preferably in the morning.

The regular feeding programme can be continued with the addition of a little extra Potash. During the formation of flower spikes the plants require this extra Potash to ensure strong, sturdy stems giving plenty of flowers.

The early flowering Cymbididiums have their flower spikes well advanced by now, and during these next few months, the flower buds will appear from under the protective sheaths (some in fact will be in full bloom). It's from here on that extra care will be needed to protect the buds from any rough weather or damage from insects. If you have a flowering house, then move plants under cover as soon as the buds appear. A start can be made on repotting your plants that need it now that the hot days have gone. If your cymbidium collection is large, then make an early start this year so that you won't be caught with too many left undone at the end of the season.

CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (APRIL/MAY 2012) by Henry Eaton

While penning these notes at the beginning of April, in spite of the occasional day when the temperatures are over 30C, autumn weather is certainly here. With culture at this time both watering frequency and fertilizing can be reduced because of the slowing of growth. Also the moisture level in the pot is increased by reduced evaporation. Be careful as to when you water your plants as they should be dry by nightfall when temperatures can fall to around 10-12C. Any moisture held up in the axil of the leaves predisposes to fungal and bacterial attack and rotting. By now most plants that will flower in Autumn, should be showing buds in the flower sheaths or in the terminal leaf axils. Those likely to flower in Winter will be showing flower sheaths. Treat affected plants as soon as an attack is seen.

Stake up the pseudo bulbs to display the flowers as well as possible. Keeping plants well separated from each other, without altering their orientation to the strongest light, allows for good air circulation and less chance of insect attack from contact between plants. If any re-potting is done now, make sure that new roots are appearing first before you do so, as many plants will die back their older roots with the onset of colder weather. Be careful particularly with yellow flowered plants and miniature Cattleya.

PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURAL NOTES (APRIL/MAY 2012) by Trevor Burnett

With the development of cooler conditions, any summer shading can be gradually removed. As the conditions cool, reduced watering will also be necessary. I personally reduce my watering back to twice a week, but am always mindful that we could still get some of those unexpected hot days, when watering will need to be monitored.

As the plants growth starts to slow, the fertilizer programme needs to be adjusted, going on a fortnightly or monthly basis for small plants (depending on your time restraints) at $\frac{1}{4}$ - $\frac{1}{2}$ strength. Over the past few years I actually cut out all fertilizer for flowering size plants, as I have found out that more plants tend to send up flowers if they are not receiving fertilizer in this period.

This is also the time of the year that we start to see and enjoy the fruits of our year's growing, with plenty of the early flowers now beginning to appear. As flower spikes appear, mark the pot with a wooden skewer with a piece of foam on top, so you are aware of all the plants that are going to flower. This also serves as a reminder to be careful when moving or cleaning nearby plants, so as not to knock off the valuable, long awaited buds.

With buds appearing, this is the time to flush out any snails or slugs that may be in hiding, just waiting for your prize plant to bloom so they can start the festive season with nice flowers to munch. If you do not wish to use chemical based baits, you can simply cut up some lemons and place around the bench. The lemon does not kill any snails or slugs, but it does attract them. Once you know their whereabouts, you can easily eradicate them with a number 10 shoe – or in my case a number 7.

Continue to remove any dead leaves from plants and also have a general cleanup of the area.

I would ensure that all of my small plants that are not expected to flower are repotted to ensure they have a nice clean, open mix before going into winter. Winter and wet feet don't mix.

THE ORCHID SOCIETY OF WESTERN AUSTRALIA'S NEW PATRON: TREVOR BURNETT

I consider it a great honour to have been nominated and elected as the Patron of The Orchid Society of Western Australia.

It was back in 1969, after attending one of the shows at the Perth Town Hall, that I joined The Orchid Society of WA. and thus began my long association with the society. At just 18 years old and being a new member of the society, I remember well those first few meetings, not knowing anyone and feeling overwhelmed by my lack of knowledge. However, I persevered and have had the privilege of meeting some wonderful people because of orchids over the last 40 years.

My first encounter with orchids was when I was just fifteen years old. My mother bought me three Cymbidium orchids from a shop in Perth and gave me the challenge of getting them to flower, so my journey commenced with reading about how to grow and flower these things called orchids. The three orchid's names were Cym. Erica Sander 'Sailor Bay' (a green), Cym. Edzel Elizabeth, (a pink) and Cym. Swallow 'Daffodil' (a yellow), but I had no idea what colour they were until I got them to flower. It took 2 years for me to flower them and from then on, the rest they say is "History".

Over the years, I have won many prizes around the shows, beginning in the 1970's with my collection of cymbidiums. When cymbidiums no longer posed a challenge, I began growing a mixture of other genera although in the early days, I sent many paphiopedilums to that place we call orchid heaven. Since then I have gained valuable knowledge and experience in growing orchids of different genera, although now I enjoy growing and

hybridizing mainly exhibition paphiopedilums. Some of the paphiopedilum plants from my breeding programme have been awarded both here in WA and in the eastern states.

I served as an Oechid Society of WA committee member in the 1990's, receiving a life membership of the society in 1996. I became a member of the AOC Judging panel of WA in 1978 and in 1989 I was elected as the State Registrar of the judging panel, a position I held for a number of years. During this time, I was also the Registrar for the 12th AOC Orchid Conference and Show held in Perth in 1991, hosted by The Orchid Society of WA. At that time, the AOC Judging panel was part of The Orchid Society of WA, then the state's parent body.

I have enjoyed supporting The Orchid Society of WA. in many different ways over the years and look forward to a rewarding and productive time as patron.
