CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (JUNE/JULY 2012) by Roy Brown

This month, the early flowering Cymbidiums will be in flower. Others will have flower buds showing through the protective sheath on the stem. Once they reach the stage where the flower buds are visible, it's time to move the plants out of the shade house and into the flowering section, where more protection can be given to them. Heavy rain or hail can chip the soft buds and so leave a permanent mark. Also strong winds can cause the plant's leaves to rub on the flowers, and this too will cause a blemish.

Cymbidiums like to grow in a position where there is plenty of free air movement, so don't completely enclose the flowering house like a glass house. This could be the reason for bud drop. Give them protection overhead from the heavy rain and also close off the sides which face the strongest winds. Don't overcrowd your plants if possible give them plenty of room between each pot.

During June we can expect cold, wet wintry days. Fertilising can be tapered off to once a fortnight. Watering will also depend upon the weather, but don't allow the pot to become dry particularly those in spike and under cover. Keep the flowering house and shade house well baited with slug and snail pellets, particularly now that the flower buds are showing

CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (JUNE/JULY 2012) by Henry Eaton

Winter temperatures during these months are usually between 8C at night and 18C during the day. This year however we have been having roughly the same at night but quite higher daytime temperatures. Cattleya grown cold in a covered shade house out of the rain will be able to survive these conditions. The danger is that of watering these plants on a cold day, with even lower temperatures at night. These conditions may lead to roots rotting from being too cold and wet at night. So adjust your watering schedule to take advantage of bright, sunny days, so that roots can dry out appreciably before a cold night. This also means that watering, maybe once or twice a fortnight is all that is needed. Judge the need for watering by lifting up some pots and assessing whether they feel light or heavy. If very light this indicates a low water level and watering is indicated. Fertilisers are not needed at this time, apart from those plants showing signs of growth, such as new growths or new roots. I find that some of the species plants are producing new growths at present.

As this is a peak flowering time of the year, keep a watch out for the appearance of buds without a sheath and also flowering sheaths. Keep water out of the axils of these leaves to avoid rotting the buds. To ensure this, peeling away the sheaths may be an option. As always, stake the flowering growths up straight and support the buds by tying the raceme to a stake, especially if the sheath has been removed. Use snail bait as needed and also keep a lookout for small caterpillars.

PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURAL NOTES (/JUNE/JULY 2012) by Trevor Burnett

With the cooler months upon us, watch you're watering just to keep the plants moist, but never leave them wet. Always water in the morning to ensure the plants are dry by nightfall. I personally, reduce my watering back further to once every 14 days, but may give additional watering if the weather is sunny for 6-8 days in a row.

Hopefully a good proportion of our plants will be showing flower spikes. Continue staking plants using wire, meat skewers or small thin bamboo stakes. This time of the year, you can start to enjoy the fruits of your previous 12 months' work with some of the early flowers now being fully developed and in full bloom. If you are missing out on a great display starting to appear, now is the time to review your culture over the past 12 months, and make any necessary changes to ensure a great show next year.

The smaller, un-flowered plants will still require fertilizer on a fortnightly or monthly basis at 1/4 - 1/2 strength, to keep the growth moving forward.

If you intend to get the plants ready for the various shows, this is the time to spend cleaning up the plants by removing any dead leaves and cleaning any dust from the leaves. Growers may use different methods of making their plants' leaves look fresh and glistening by using white oil, but I personally believe a little common milk with water wiped over the leaves does a wonderful job without that oily look.

At this time of the year most growers do not water plants overhead, due to possible marking of flowers for shows. I do water overhead, but after watering I ensure the pouch is emptied of water and excess water is not left on the remainder of the plant. This can be easily achieved by gently tapping the flower.

Popular vote: Open: Den. Madam Udomsri x Jaquelin Concert– owner I Duncan. This intermediate Dendrobium had 17 beautiful dark burgundy flowers on a single raceme. The plant is grown in a terracotta pot in a mix consisting of ~60% stones & expanded clay & ~40% bark. From December to March the plant is hung high in the shade house and is watered carefully on account of the very open mix. During the Winter the plant is grown under cover but still in good light, and has recently been in the hothouse to ensure the flowers open.

Jim O'Hare: Preparing plants for Shows (from OSWA's April meeting)

Presentation & breeding are both important. A plant with good breeding but presented poorly may not do well at a show, but a plant with lesser breeding can do well if it is presented well. Plants should be clean. Clean the leaves by wiping them with a tissue dampened with a mixture of water & milk. The milk & water mixture leaves a casein-like varnish on the leaves. Avoid using oil to make the leaves shiny – it is not good for the plants. Take care with pots & tags too. Since orchid pots are often marked and weathered, some growers sit the pot containing the orchid inside a slightly larger new pot and fill the space between the inner pot & the new pot with clean potting mix, then scatter clean potting mix over the top of the old mix so that it looks nice. Plants should be free from pests: scale, mealybugs, aphids, ants etc. If pests are present, the plant cannot be judged, & plants that are nearby at the show can be contaminated.

Preparing a plant for a show starts well before the show, when flower spikes first appear. At this time, the plant should be in a place with good light, & when the flowers are about to open the plant should be protected from rain & overhead watering. As the spike grows it should be supported (staked) as required, so that when the flowers develop they display well. Care should be taken to keep the plant in the same position relative to the sun because the flowers will tend to grow towards the light – if the plant is turned around when only half the flowers have developed, then the rest of the flowers will develop pointing in a different direction, & the display on the raceme will be unattractive. Before the plant is brought to the show, any stakes should be trimmed so they end below the top of the raceme to avoid the risk of someone being poked in the eye ("there is nothing worse than a one-eyed judge!"). Alternatively, the top of the wire stakes can be curled over. Any flower that needs to be supported by the stake can only be tied below the ovary. Pendulous racemes do not need to be staked, but sometimes staking of pendulous racemes can be helpful to prevent damage during transport. If a flower is knocked off during transport to the show, it should be placed in the pot, so the plant can be considered for judging.

Each entry at the show has an entry card to indicate the class the plant is entered in, along with other information. If unsure about the class, you can place the plant with its entry card, on the "query table" to have it checked by judges – they will correct the card if necessary & sign the back. Then you can move the plant to the appropriate judging area for that class. When putting plants on benches, take care not to damage other people's plants, & take care to put your plant in the right area for its class. If it is not in the right area, even if it has the right information on the entry card, the judges might not be able to find it during judging. In addition to the entry card, specimen plants require a blue tag & seedlings require a red tag. These coloured tags help the judges to locate the specimen & seedling plants, which are normally scattered all over the judging area. Seedlings are plants that are flowering for the first time. They must be whole plants (old back bulbs cannot have been cut off), and they must be grown from seeds, they cannot be mericlones (grown by tissue culture from a single parent). The parentage (crossing) must be indicated on the entry card.

Janine Mirosevich & Judy Brabin: Bromeliads - great companion plants for orchids (from OSWA's May meeting)

There are over 2000 varieties of Bromeliads & over 100 hybrids. Most bromeliads are epiphytes. They are hardy plants & can be grown under a range of conditions, depending on the type of bromeliad. They like a free draining potting mix but at the same time they need to be stable in the pot, so sometimes they need to be staked. Janine grows many bromeliads wired onto the trunk of a tree fern, with a bit of sphagnum & paperbark around the roots. Judy showed a large hanging specimen that was anchored on a piece of an old branch (again tied on with wire, & sphagnum & paperbark around the roots). When watering the "cup" should be filled to overflowing, but to avoid rot, water in the cup should not be left to stagnate. Growing bromeliads in small pots also helps to avoid rot. Tillandsias do not need soil, & can be grown on wire, fishing line etc. or can be glued to wood. I Duncan recalled seeing many little Tillandsias growing on the shade cloth walls of an orchid shade house in north Queensland. Bromeliads take up nutrients through their leaves. Fertilise from spring to mid-autumn, using ¼ strength to ½ strength liquid fertilizer (Janine uses Eco c-weed), or slow release fertilizer in the potting mix. Do not over feed bromeliads. Quilling (crinkling) of the leaves is caused by over fertilizing. Bromeliads need good light, but if it is too bright the leaves become yellow or faded, & can get sunburnt. If it is too dark, the leaves become dark, long & droopy. Bromeliads are not troubled by many pests but occasionally can be attacked by scale or mealy bug. These pests can be treated by Confidor, but not in the cup of the plant. Judy noted that it is believed that the current scarcity of bees is due to overuse of Confidor, & that natural pesticides should be used when possible. If necessary, bromeliads can be treated with sulfur-based fungicides, but not copper-based ones. From seed, bromeliads cn take from 3-30 years to flower, but it takes just 1-3 years for "pups" to flower. Pups should not be removed until they are at least 1/3 the size of the mother plant. A trick to encourage flowering is to put an apple in a plastic bag & leave it there until it liquefies, & then pour it into the cup of the bromeliad & leave it there for 3-4 days. The ethylene produced by the decomposing apple induces flowering. After 3-4 days the apple goop must be washed out of the cup to prevent rotting
