#### CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (MAY/JUNE 2012) by Roy Brown

During May some of the early flowering Cymbidiums will be in flower. Others will have flower buds showing through the protective sheath on the stem. Once they reach the stage where the flower buds are visible, it's time to move the plants out of the shade house and into the flowering house, where more protection can be given to them. Heavy rain or hail can chip the soft buds and so leave a permanent mark, also strong winds can cause the plants leaves to rub on the flower and this too will cause a blemish.

Cymbidiums like to grow in a position where there is plenty of free air movement, so don't completely enclose the flowering house like a glass house. This could be the reason for bus drop. Give them protection overhead from the heavy rain and also close off sides which face the strongest winds. Don't overcrowd your plants, if possible give them plenty of room between each pot.

By the end of May we can expect cold, wet wintery weather. Watering will also depend on the weather, but don't allow the pots to become dry, particularly those in spike, and those under cover.

Keep the shade house and flowering house well baited Baysol pellets for slugs and snails, particularly now that flower buds are showing.

#### CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (MAY/JUNE 2012) by Henry Eaton

Autumnal weather has at last been established with relatively cold nights and warm days. This has meant that those plants that flower in autumn have begun to do so with plenty of blooms. The weather forecasting boffins predict that the La Nina effect that has been determining our weather pattern is now diminishing and normal weather patterns at this time of the year should return. As always, culture of your plants will be dependent on the prevailing weather. Because of the cold there will be a slowing of activity in the plant, so that watering needs will lessen and fertilization can be reduced to once a month or so. This is not a good time for repotting unless the mix in the pot has deteriorated badly, or new roots are being formed and are over the edge of the pot. In the latter instance an alternative is to place the whole plant in a larger pot without disturbing the mix, and fill the remaining space with moist, fresh mix. Repotting can be completed in the spring. The other method is to place a pot full of mix beneath the roots spilling over, so they can establish themselves in it and not be air pruned, as would otherwise occur. As the intensity of the sun now declines, all shading can be removed and the plants will benefit from the increased warmth and light.

To protect the flowers from spotting with Botrytis, try and maintain a good flow of air around the plants by hanging them up or keeping a fan blowing gently over the plants. The flowers also need protection from slugs and snails by placing baits in the pot and near the flower sheath. Also keep water off the flowers by hand watering into the pot and growing the flowering plants where they are out of the reach of the rain.

After flowering, plants can be grown in an area where they can experience a rest period, during which they receive little or no water, until they show signs of activity again with the appearance of new roots or a swelling growth bud at the base of the pseudo bulb.

#### PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURAL NOTES (MAY/JUNE 2012) by Trevor Burnett

Similar growing conditions as last month, but as the conditions cool, reduced watering will also be necessary. I personally, reduce my watering back further to once every 10 days, but I am always mindful that we could still get some of those unexpected hot days when watering will need to be adjusted. We would need to get 3-4 hot days in a row before I would adjust my watering programme.

We should be seeing a good proportion of our plants now producing spikes, and the early flowering types will be well advanced and should be staked to prevent twisting and breakage, as the spikes will be soft and not fully set to support the flower.

The plant growth will have started to slow considerably on the flowering plants as all the effort is now being channeled into supporting the flowers. Fertilising programmes need to be adjusted, going to fertilizer with less nitrogen and more phosphate and potassium, to improve the strength and quality of the flowers.

The smaller un-flowered plants will still require fertilizer at  $\frac{1}{4}$  -  $\frac{1}{2}$  strength, on a fortnightly or monthly basis, to keep the growth moving forward.

With more buds appearing weekly, continue staking plants using meat skewers, wire stakes or thin bamboo canes. If you decide to use wire, ensure the top is turned over and watch your eyes don't get poked when working with plants.

If you are moving plants to a different area to flower, ensure they are returned to the same orientation to the previous light source. Turning plants can cause flower stems to become twisted, spoiling the effect if you wish to enter them in the various shows.

My tip for the month is – if you are growing the plants without heat (which I do during the winter) I tend to keep the plants dryer than usual, as wet, cold conditions are often fatal to roots.

<u>Orchid Talks for the Public –</u> We are hopeful of strong public attendance and have significant active public programmes including cultural talks and demonstrations on most of the commonly grown orchids planned. These talks and demonstrations will take place in the Market Place. The event is to be promoted through newsprint, both local and state wide as well as on radio and television, getting our message out to as many interested locals as possible.

<u>http://www.waorchids.iinet.net.au/Lecture\_Program.htm</u> We have moved the Lecture Program from the initially planned Botanical Room at the Burswood into the Astral Room because of the large numbers now anticipated. This means that all elements of the Conference will take place on the same floor level.

<u>Accommodation Shortage</u> – If you are coming to the 19<sup>th</sup> AOC Conference & Show in Perth and have not yet booked your accommodation, you might wish to consider doing so sooner rather than later. Accommodation in Perth is becoming extremely tight due to the extensive activity in the mining industry. Western Australia is experiencing significant growth in the minerals and petroleum industries with numerous major projects under construction and increased mining activity which is impacting on accommodation facilities in Perth. Although these projects are principally in the Pilbara region, the accommodation shortages are forcing more and more companies to implement additional fly in/fly out (FIFO) arrangements which are impacting all of Perth's accommodation availability, particularly that which normally services tourists and conference delegates. I will give information on Hawaii's flower booster formula as a bonus". And on Cattleyas…"creating new colours using C. intermedia var. aquinii in mini & compact Cattleyas.
