# CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (JANUARY/FEBRUARY 2014) by Roy Brown

These are very hot months with the temperatures in the high 30's, so regular use of the sprinklers is an absolute must. Create as much humidity as possible, keeping the pots and the area around your plants as damp as possible.

It's my opinion that the next month or two are the most important ones for the successful flowering of Cymbidiums. THE NEW GROWTHS MUST BE KEPT GROWING SO THEY WILL BULB UP IN TIME

TO PRODUCE THEIR FLOWER SPIKES. To do this they will need as much light as they can take without actual burning of the leaves, plenty of fertilizer and water.

For those who grow their plants under 50% Sarlon Shade Cloth, you will find the plants leaves have become a yellowy green. This is mainly because of the bright light we experience here in WA, the skies being cloudless during the summer months. Provided the bulbs are nice and plump and the plants are healthy, this yellowing is a good sign that the plant should flower this season. A plant grown under too heavy shade conditions will have dark green leaves, lush foliage and will not produce as many spikes of flowers as one that has been grown under bright sunlight.

If you find that your plants are troubled by red spider mite, thrip, scale etc. then give them a spraying with insecticide. It's during the next couple of months that the flower spikes are produced and it is a good idea to have the plants free from all insect pests well in advance so that no harm will come to the young flower spikes when they show up.

# CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (JANUARY/FEBRUARY 2014) from notes of the late Henry Eaton

As expected, the hot weather has at last arrived. With the onset of hot, dry conditions examination of your plants will show the development of new growths, which will elongate quickly. Culture has thus to be adjusted to take these factors into account.

Increase shading if necessary and the use of fans to cool the growing area is called for. Because of the dryness, watering frequency will need to be increased as the mix dries out sooner, in order also to help with enlargement of the new growths. Damping down of the growing area, watering or misting beneath the benches will help with raising humidity.

A fertilizer programme will also be needed to provide sufficient Nitrogen (N) for growth, as well as Potassium (K) for maturing those growths. The aim should be to produce big, fat bulbs without inducing the appearance of weak new growths. The new growths should be watched to train them into an erect position before they mature off, so that when flowers appear they are well displayed.

At this time of the year look out for the appearance of cockroaches, grasshoppers, scale insects and other pests and deal with them promptly. Snails and slugs are ever present, but not as many as when the ground is wet in the wintery months

#### PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURE NOTES (JANUARY/FEBRUARY 2014) by Trevor Burnett

The hot weather will be in full swing during these months but I still only water three times a week. If the forecast is for very hot weather over four days, I will increase watering to every second day, but always only early in the morning.

Keep your additional shading in place if the plants are showing signs of yellowing, as they are receiving more light than is required. If plants show any signs of burning, add some extra shade for the next few months.

Any burning will cause a setback at this stage, which will definitely effect our flowering season.

If you have a variety of size pots, you will need to ensure that the smaller pots do not dry out completely before watering. A simple solution to prevent the problem of some pots drying out quicker is to double pot, so the final size pots in the house are the same. By this I mean placing the smaller pots into a larger pot, which is filled with compost, which encircles the smaller pot. This way all the pots end up drying at the same rate.

Paphiopedilum growths should be promoted, so keep the regular fertilizer programme in place to ensure the growths mature ready for the flowering season ahead.

Let's get back to looking after our plants after our Christmas break, to regular, routine checking of:

- a) Good air movement
- b) If in a glasshouse, misting to assist with maintaining humidity
- c) Weekly fertilizing

- d) Not overcrowding our plants
- e) Pests, and treat if necessary
- f) Keep area clean of drying leaves or material
- g) Increase watering to three times a week, more often if plants have dried out
- h) Check all plants to see if there are any signs of stress
- i) Water in the early morning before the sun is too high
- j) Watch and control your shading

### Letter from the President of the Australian Orchid Council, Jim Shaughnessy (January 2014)

Hi everybody,

Welcome to 2014. I hope that you all had a good Christmas and New Year.

There were many suggestions made at the Board of Management meeting in October to improve the running of the AOC, communication between the AOC and the AOC finances, and some of these are expected to be implemented during this year. One of the most important suggestions is that each club keeps in contact with their State Delegate and feeds him/her any thoughts or ideas that you may have towards helping the AOC, as the Council can only operate successfully if each and every club supports it. I have heard this question from many clubs: "What does the AOC do for us?" May I suggest that this be a two-way street so that the question is also asked: "What can I do to assist the AOC?" Much work is done by the Officers of Council at no cost to the AOC and considerable time and effort to see that everything runs smoothly. There are only four people involved in the day-to-day running of the AOC, though at least another four are heavily involved in behind-the-scenes work at their own expense. Some of these are listed on the letterhead for this newsletter. In addition there are the seven State Delegates who form the Board of Management who assist us where possible.

Some suggestions that have already been forwarded from some of the States to assist with finances of Council include having raffles at some of their major shows and making direct donations to the AOC (and some have done this). Our aim is to keep the running costs down, which has already happened in many ways, with significant reductions, but more has to be done. It is your organisation – we are only the elected people to improve orchid growing people throughout the country. You will find in the introduction the name of your State Delegate with a contact email address. Please support him/her as the ears and eyes of the Council in your State and a direct door to the Council.

One way that I can assist you is to pass on suggestions for club activities from the Delegates' reports at the Board of Management Meeting or from club newsletters. The ideas from the 2013 BOM Meeting included:

From WA: The Inter-society Challenge gives social contacts and gets the public involved in joining clubs. The President suggested an AOC stall or raffle as an AOC fundraiser. Instead of selling stock, could have samples of what is available and take orders.

From TAS: Compost mix day is a good day where all clubs get together and there is a job for everyone. Devonport had a buy, sell & swap day which attracted buyers from all over the state. A suggestion for a possible fundraiser was a raffle with a trip to the World Orchid Conference as a prize.

From NT – has two clubs. Both held successful auctions to raise funds. Items had a reserve price and all amounts above the reserve prices went to the club.

From SA: OCSA, the founding club has members who work with students from 3 high schools - they learn how to grow orchids and have their own section at shows. Substantial fundraisers are sausage sizzles at Bunnings.

Thea and I will be doing some travelling this year as time and circumstances permit to other states. I already have commitments to Queensland and would like to visit some parts of Victoria and NSW if possible. We thank the many clubs who are sending us their club newsletter or bulletin as this gives us direct contact with your club. If you are not already sending us your newsletter or bulletin, please consider doing so.
