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CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2014) by Roy Brown

Most of the dividing and re-potting of our Cymbidiums should be completed by now because once we reach the middle of November, the weather pattern will have changed from warm Spring days to hot, dry days with easterly winds, and these conditions of course are not suited to dividing & repotting our plants. Any pots that were not attended to will be better left until next Autumn.

From November on, with the increase in temperatures, we must increase the watering too. Provided the pots have good drainage, the plants will appreciate having the surrounding area nice and damp all through the summer period.

This is, of course, the start of the summer culture, and this means adding fertilizer, once a week or each fortnight as you prefer. If you are not too certain as to just how much fertilizer to apply, then always err on the lighter side. It's far better to give the plants two applications of half strength fertilizer than one dose that is too strong. Always remember to give the pots a good watering before you apply the fertilizer, and then another good, heavy watering several days later.

In the meantime, of course, if you have fine misting overhead then use these to keep the plant leaves, benches and surrounding area nice and damp.

During November and December the sun's rays are increasing and shining more directly overhead each day. If it should shine directly through a break in the overhead material of your shade house, then the plants beneath could suffer with badly sunburnt leaves and this will affect the efficiency of the plant in producing the necessary plant sugars. Once plant leaves are sunburnt they do not repair themselves and the scar will stay until the leaf eventually dies.

CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2014) from records of the late Henry Eaton.

November, so far, has been cool and unexpectedly quite wet. We should therefore, be even more awake to the onset of real hot summer weather in the next few weeks.

With Cattleyas, remember they like to dry out after being well watered, before they receive their next drink. The important fact to remember is that you adjust the frequency of watering to suit the density of the mix you use, and growing good roots that can breathe freely will ensure that the green parts of the plants above ground will develop well very successfully.

One might have to increase shading if temperatures soar too high (over 35C or so). A misting system beneath the benches will also help, as well as fans blowing cool air over the plants. Keep the ground beneath the benches damp to increase humidity.

Fertilise regularly to attain maximum growth but perhaps go lightly once temperatures reach 35C or more.

Begin to look out now for the appearance of flowering sheaths on some of the maturing growths. If any are seen, try to position them so that water will not be retained in the axil of the leaf and any flowering sheath. Make sure also that you straighten out the bulbs so that they remain erect and will display the flowers as well as possible.

As the temperatures increase, so do the insects and pests. Keep a lookout for caterpillars, scale and mealy bug which multiply very quickly in these conditions. Treat them as soon as they are identified as causing trouble.

Hand watering your plants gives an excellent opportunity to observe their leaf colour – too dark a green will indicate that not enough light is reaching your plant, too reddish indicates too much light and the need for extra shading). You may also spot other potential problems such as insect damage or ants making home in the pots. Treat any problems promptly with the appropriate products.

PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURAL NOTES (NOVEMBER/DECEMBER 2014) by Trevor Burnett

Paphiopedilum growing season will now be fully in progress. The plants should be producing new roots which will support the new growths, which should be developing strongly.

As the sun power is increasing towards summer, it is time to consider whether you need to increase the shading required to stop any burning. Generally with our hot conditions, plants may appreciate a little additional shading. Pass your hand over the plants on a bright and sunny day can indicate the amount of shading required. The shadow cast should only be faint. The plants should not be excessively dark green, as this indicates a lack of light.

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PAPHIOPEDILUM (cont.)

Bright light produces the best flowering, but if too bright, burning will occur and plants will suffer a setback which will be reflected in the flowering result later in the year. It is also very important to keep up good air movement.

As the plants will be growing strongly now, a weekly application of fertilizer at ¼ to ½ strength with a high Nitrogen base, will promote good development of the new growths.

With the warmer days I increase my watering to to twice a week.

Do not crowd your plants in the growing area, as plenty of fresh air movement is essential for the good health of your plants.

Once again, with the warmer weather, check your plants and the surrounding area for mealy bugs, ants and other bugs, that may decide to move into the cooler condition of a shade or glass house where greater moisture content is available. It is much easier to get rid of the pest when there are only a few and not let them multiply, which makes the task harder.

New Orchid Nursery: Orchidup - the place of orchids

Orchidup is a new orchid nursery, at Walpole. The owners are David and Liz Edmonds. Orchidup specializes in cool growing orchids, including cymbidiums, cattleyas, Australian native dendrobiums, sarcochilus, masdevallias, zygopetalums, miltoniopsis and a large selection of oncidium alliance plants. The nursery is not formally open to the public but the owners are happy to supply orchids by mail or receive visitors by appointment. The nursery is part of a working farm, so it is essential that anyone planning to visit calls beforehand to ensure the owners will be available. Perth growers who have already visited Orchidup report that it is an interesting nursery that is well worth the trip.

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
