This month's guest speaker: Norm Stockton

Norm is one of Australia's most knowledgeable experts on native orchids, especially *Dendrobium speciosum*. His knowledge is vast and he seems to know everything about every form and every clone of this iconic Australian orchid species. He speaks of them as if they are close friends...he knows their parents, their offspring, where they live in the wild, what conditions they like, and how they look. Do yourself a favour and don't miss this chance to see Norm speak on one of his favourite topics.

Spring Show: Kardinya Shopping Centre, NEXT WEEK!

- Loading the ute for the show: OSWA Shed, Neil McDougall Park, Como, Sunday 28th August, at 2pm. Access to the shed is via the driveway opposite number 27 Clydesdale Street.
- Show Setup happens on Tuesday 30th August, from about 5:30 pm; entries received from 6 pm; judging to start at around 7:15 pm.
- Show open to public Wednesday 31st August to 4.30 pm Saturday 3rd September. Plant sales daily.

For setting up, we have been asked to enter the shopping centre via the door near Liquorland and the pharmacy, *not* via the door near Coles and the kebab shop. Roster, Sales Sheets, Entry Cards etc will be available at the August General Meeting. If you don't have perfect plants to enter in the competition, please consider bringing them in for the display. If you don't have any plants for display, please consider coming along anyway, to help set up and pack up the display, or look after the display and chat to members of the public. Also, please consider signing up for a shift or three in the roster to look after our display. No special skills are required, just enthusiasm for sharing your love of orchids with the public. Visit to Floraplant Nursery

Trevor has arranged for an OSWA visit to Floraplant Nursery on Saturday 10 September, starting at 9 am sharp. The Floraplant people have very few times when they are able to host visitors, so we are lucky to have this opportunity. This event has been very popular in the past.

Floraplant has expanded from orchid production towards other interesting plants—indoor plants, bromeliads, aroids, succulents, and even carnivorous plants—but they still grow orchids as well! Plants will be available for sale, but Floraplant does not accept Eftpos so bring cash to make purchases. Floraplant has done us a big favour by letting us visit and gives us very good prices. Please do not haggle or attempt to negotiate further discounts. This visit cannot accommodate a large group, so it is only open to financial members of OSWA. Non-members and non-financial members cannot attend without express permission from the OSWA committee prior to the event.

Goings on in October

The past month has been busy and the busy-ness will continue into November. In October, we have our **Potting Workshop** on Sunday 16th October, and then the **Perth Garden Festival** on 27-30 October (with setup on 26 October). A couple of members who usually help out at these events will be away during October so we will need some new faces to help out this year. The Potting Workshop is a great opportunity to hang out with fellow orchid enthusiasts, share your knowledge with members of the public, and learn new potting skills and techiques. Both events are very rewarding.

Looking for native orchids in the bush?

This is the time of year when the Western Australian bush comes alive with spring wildflowers. Amongst the wildflowers, terestrial orchids are abundant. Apparently the donkey orchids are out already, while spider orchids will be out soon. Orchids can be seen in many bush reserves including Kings Park and Wireless Hill and fragments of bush around Leeming and Ferndale. If you plan to trek through bushland to look for orchids in the wild, keep in mind that dieback, which can be spread by bushwalking, poses a serious threat to Australia's biodiversity. See the info at the end of this bulletin for tips on how to prevent the spread of dieback.

Intersociety Orchid Display and Workshop 2022 -- Thank you.

Thank you to all who helped with OSWA's contribution to the Intersociety Orchid Display and Workshop in Busselton by loaning plants, transporting plants to and from the venue, attending the event, helping to set up and pack up the display, etc, etc. As always, the ISODW was enjoyed by all who attended. Busselton and Districts Orchid Society did a fine job to put on the event. The dinner in Saturday night was a highlight, with Harry taking the honours for the highest bid for an orchid at the auction.

As usual, ISODW included competitions for best display and best benched orchids. In the display competition, Northern Districts Orchid Society and South Eastern Orchid Society tied for first place.

South Eastern Orchid Society deserves special commendation because their display partly collapsed on Saturday afternoon after the judging, but the SEOS folks managed to put it back together almost perfectly on Sunday morning before the show opened to the public at 9 am. In the benched plants competition, points were awarded for orchids that received a 1st (3 points), 2nd (2 points) or 3rd (1 point) in their class. OSWA scored the highest raw score but the competition is a handicap event, and after taking into account the handicap, Bunbury Orchid Society was the overall points winner, with OSWA and Busselton and Districts Orchid Society equal in 2nd place. This excellent result would not have been possible without the support of the many members who loaned plants for the ISODW, and to Barbara, Trevor, Harry, Lina, Jacqui, Eric, and Courtney, who put the display together, and Trevor and Maxine, coordinated the benching.

Where to buy orchids and orchid-related paraphernalia

We are compiling a list of vendors that sell orchids or orchid-related items (pots, stakes, watering equipment, benches, shade houses, shade house covers, special shade cloth, devices for climate control...). If there are things that you'd like for your orchid hobby but don't know where to get them, let Murray know and he will do his best to track down a supplier (or at least find someone else who can track down a supplier). The list of vendors will eventually be published in the bulletin and/or on OSWA's webpage...I promise.

Useful online resources

Since it is taking the Editor a long time to sort out a list of where to buy orchids and orchid-related paraphernalia, here is a short list of websites that may be interesting to members in the meantime.

https://powo.science.kew.org

This site is *Plants of the World Online*, maintained by Kew Gardens. It is the definitive database of plant names and often includes pictures and info about distribution of plants in the wild, common names, and other stuff. Plants (not just orchids) can be searched for by common names or scientific names. It contains data for species only, not hybrids. It currently contains 1,234,000 plant names, 140,400 detailed descriptions, and 367,600 images, accumulated from the last 250 years of botanical research and exploration.

This is the definitive database for orchid names. The database can be searched by orchid name or partial name, or by parentage. At its simplest, the database can be used to check spelling of names of orchids (I use it every month to check names of plants entered in the monthly plant competition). At a more sophisticated level, the database can be used to find the parents and registration details for a particular hybrid orchid, or the progeny of a particular crossing (paying attention to which parent supplied

the pollen and which parent produced the seeds). The database is most useful for hybrids, but it also has names of species orchids.

This database is a bit like an online version of the orchid database program Orchid Wiz. It provides information about species orchids (distribution, photos, progeny) and hybrid orchids (photos, parentage, progeny). The parentage information is interesting...it includes family-tree type info, which allows you to track the parentage of a particular hybrid back to species orchids, and it also presents parentage in percentage terms. This info can be handy — if you want to know conditions that will likely suit a particular hybrid, you can make an educated guess based on the conditions that the dominant species in the hybrid's parentage would experience in its natural habitat. It isn't quite as good as Orchid Wiz (which contains cultural information and awards information for orchid species and hybrids), but since Orchid Wiz is being discontinued from December 2022, www.orchidroots.com will become an increasingly important resource for orchid enthusiasts.

This database is probably my favourite. It currently contains info on 24,698 species in 865 orchid genera, and is being continuously updated. Info included ranges from orchid names and photos to distribution of the orchid in the wild, descriptions of taxonomy and natural habitat, and detailed referencing to original scientific literature. So, if you have a hybrid that you are having trouble growing, consult https://www.orchidroots.com to find out its species parentage, then consult https://www.orchidspecies.com to find out the conditions that would best suit the species parents, and try to mimic those conditions in your own orchid growing area.

Social Media (YouTube, Facebook, etc)

I tend not to use social media, but occasionally when googling I find links to very useful info on YouTube. For example, if you google "springfield orchids site:youtube.com" the top hit is a link to a video by Nado Lenkic about repotting cymbidiums. Nado is the owner of Springfield Orchids (in Kalamunda). He specialises in cymbidiums, and while his video is an excellent introduction to repotting cymbidiums, many of the principles he demonstrates are applicable to repotting in general. If you google "lynn brooks orchid youtube" the top hit is a link to Lynn's own YouTube channel (which is, of course, about orchids).

As to Facebook, well, I don't understand that at all, even though OSWA has an excellent Facebook page (https://www.facebook.com/orchidsWA, thanks Kirsty!). Keng Leow understands Facebook better than I, and found an informative video there about how to pot keikis and keep them stable in the pot: https://www.facebook.com/groups/orchidstipsandtricks/permalink/2360500377424541 (or if that is too long, you can use https://tinyurl.com/keikikeiki). The method demonstrated in the video is pretty cool, and I will definitely be trying it myself. I am sure there is lots of other good stuff on Facebook, but explaining how to get at it is a job for someone else.

GENERAL ORCHID CULTURE NOTES FOR DJILBA (APPROX. AUGUST/SEPTEMBER)

The Orchid Society of Western Australia would like to acknowledge that our meetings are held on the traditional lands of the Noongar people. Unlike climate descriptions in terms of the four seasons in the European calendar, the Noongar people describe the climate of Western Australia's South West as having six seasons, guided by what is happening and changing around us, rather than specific 'dates' on a calendar. This approach to describing Perth's climate is helpful for guiding our orchid related jobs for the year. Djilba (approx. August/September) is known as the 'first spring'. While weather can still be cold and wet, we begin to experience longer hours of daylight and an increasing number of pleasant warm days. The West Australian landscape bursts into life with wildflowers (including our spectacular native terrestrial orchids) and this floral display corresponds with peak flowering season for the orchids we grow. It's a busy time of the year, with many orchid-related shows and events!

We are heading into the second month of Djilba. Culture notes for Djilba were published in the July Bulletin and will not be reproduced here. One thing that has become apparent since July though is that black hairy caterpillars are rampant this year, and they love to feast on orchid blooms. Keep an eye out for those babies, especially if you don't have your orchids in an enclosed shadehouse.

Courntey gives his plants a teaspoon of Seamungus pellets, followed by a teaspoon of Strike Back pellets a month later. In addition, Courtney gives very dilute liquid fertilizer with every watering.

Enid learned her fertilizing regime from Courtney, and uses the same regime for the pellets, but doesn't have quite as much time to use the liquid fertilizer. This plant was one of Enid's three free orchids when she first joined the club.



Dieback affected community

Understanding Dieback and Hygiene


Bushwalking, driving or field operations in bushland areas have the potential to spread dieback.

Dieback (*Phytophthora cinnamomi*) is a plant pathogen that originated in the Asian tropics. It is recognised as one of the key threatening processes to Australia's biodiversity.

BE CLEAN IN THE GREEN

Dieback lives in soil, water and plant material. It attacks roots restricting the uptake of water and nutrients. Its thread-like vegetative mycelium feeds on and destroys plant cells. This kills the plant.

The pathogen produces different microscopic spores; short-lived swimming zoospores during warm moist conditions and long-lived dormant spores that can survive in dry conditions and after fire.

People Spread Dieback

Human activity causes the greatest spread of dieback. Road building and maintenance, mining, off-road driving, bushwalking and gardening can introduce and spread the pathogen through infected material. Dieback can then spread quickly downhill in water and slowly by growing from root to root.

DON'T SPREAD THE RED


Strict hygiene and effective management are essential to minimise the risk of dieback spread. In most cases, removing all mud and soil from footwear, vehicles, machinery and equipment minimises the risk of spreading the plant pathogen.

Community, industry and government are working together to control the spread of dieback. The following guidelines provide information on the most effective ways to "be clean in the green".

HYGIENE GUIDELINES

PLANNING & PREPARATION



Consider your risk of Spreading Dieback

Will your activity involve any movement of soil or plant material?

- · Schedule activities for low rainfall months and avoid wet or muddy conditions.
- · Be aware of Dieback Free and Infested areas prior to activities.
- · Inspect and clean vehicles, equipment and footwear before entering bushland.
- · Prepare a dieback hygiene kit.

Footwear & Equipment

- · Stay on established roads and tracks.
- · Do not enter dieback restricted areas and be aware of dieback signage.
- Ensure all soil or plant material is sourced from dieback free certified pits and nurseries.
- · Seek up to date information and further advice at dieback.net.au
- · Strategic mapping also available at didms.gaiaresources.com.au

Field Hygiene Kit

Prepare and carry a hygiene kit in packs and/or vehicles to help keep footwear, vehicles and equipment clean.

Spray 70% methylated spirits on footwear and equipment after brushing and

· Use boot cleaning stations where available and use a dieback hygiene kit

What to have in your kit...

· Brush (e.g. scrubbing brush, pick & brush)

when entering and exiting bushland.

· Sprayers (e.g. hand sprayer, garden pressure sprayer).


Try to remove mud and soil when it is dry with a brush.


· 70% Methylated spirits or approved sterilant.



Vehicles & Machinery

Dry Clean









Wash-down

- Use wash-down station or pressurised spray unit to remove any remaining soil, mud and plant material.
- Wash-down on a hard, well drained surface in low lying areas (e.g. road, ramp or grate) and designated clean down points when entering dieback protection areas. Consider where runoff will drain.
- · Use approved sterilant in wash-down water.
- Do not drive through wash-down effluent.
