Thanks also to Courtney for loaning some plants for our display. Approximately 5,000 people attended the market, which was many more than the expected 2,000 – 3,000. We were able to drop off our gear close to where our stall was to be set up. Setting up was pretty quick and straightforward. The weather was perfect and our stall was close to a coffee truck and the Orchidup stall! The Tibetan food stall was excellent! Food and drink stalls outnumbered garden stalls, which worked in our favour as we stood out from the crowd. Our display drew a lot of attention. We gave out a lot of membership flyers, culture notes, colouring pages and orchid stickers throughout the day, and sold most of the plants on our sales table. We would have sold many more plants if we had more in flower to sell. The organizers have announced that they will stage another Garden and Gourmet Market on Saturday 30th November. Consider helping out at the OSWA stall, or just going along for fun, it's a nice event to while away a few hours.

GENERAL ORCHID CULTURE NOTES FOR DJILBA (APPROX. AUGUST/SEPTEMBER)

The Orchid Society of Western Australia would like to acknowledge that our meetings are held on the traditional lands of the Noongar people. Unlike the European calendar, the Noongar people describe the climate of Western Australia's South West as having six seasons guided by what is happening and

changing around us, rather than specific 'dates' on a calendar. This approach to describing Perth's climate is helpful for guiding our orchid related jobs for the year. Djilba (approx. August/September) is known as the 'first spring'. While weather can still be cold and wet, we begin to experience longer hours of daylight and an increasing number of pleasant warm days. The West Australian landscape bursts into life with wildflowers (including our spectacular native terrestrial orchids) and this floral display corresponds with peak flowering season for the orchids we grow. It's a busy time of the year, with many orchid-related shows and events!

- ✓ With many orchids coming into flower, have a think about which plants you can bring to events. In addition to letting others appreciate your plants, orchids brought into OSWA meetings are eligible to win our popular votes (winners receive a prize!) and can be nominated for Australian Orchid Council Awards. Orchids benched at shows may also receive prize money and awards!
- ✓ The large number of events (with the inevitable sales tables) also gives you the opportunity to build your orchid collection. In general it's a good idea to repot newly acquired orchids into a mix that you are familiar with.
- ✓ In addition to repotting newly acquired orchids, think about which of your own orchids need repotting. This is a big job and often takes longer than expected! Reasons to repot include:
 - the plant has grown too large for the existing container;
 - the potting material has broken down and must be replaced (holding too much moisture, not free draining etc);
 - the plant has naturally divided into two pieces (or has rotting bulbs in the centre);
 - > you have purchased plants from various sources, and therefore in various different media.
- ✓ The watering habit of the grower will influence potting mix selection. If you are a compulsive user of water and have difficulty holding back, then you will need a more open mix to allow for plants to dry out a little between watering. On the other hand, someone who is sparing with watering or is away from home for a period may require a finer mix that is able to retain water longer (but therefore may need protection from rain to avoid the mix becoming 'too wet' in winter).
- ✓ Watering at this time of the year is best done in the morning, aiming to allow orchids to dry by nightfall. Try to plan watering for clear sunny days.
- ✓ Try to avoid overhead watering/sprinklers at this time of year, as many orchids are in flower, and flowers can easily blemish if water is allowed to splash on the petals.
- ✓ Use rainwater where possible—there's no shortage of it this time of year, orchids love it, and we all have a responsibility to be water-wise gardeners.
- ✓ If you have a solid cover for your shade house, it can stay on until the wet weather has passed. Orchids that require a dry winter rest or have reduced growth during winter should be kept on the dry side, and given minimal (if any) fertilizer.
- ✓ Snails and slugs are still active in the wet weather, so apply pellets to help control populations (use the expensive, moisture resistant ones that do not disintegrate and go mouldy).


