#### CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (JULY/AUGUST 2018) based on notes from Henry Eaton

July and August are usually the coldest months of the year. This seems to be holding true in 2016. Culture of your cattleyas depends on keeping the plants out of the rain so that the roots are not sitting in a cold wet mix, which if it is maintained for a while, will result in the death of the roots. Watering can be done on a bright day, as early in the day as possible, so the plant can dry out as much as possible before the cold night sets in. Also remember that cattleyas like to dry out between waterings, so they may only need two or three waterings for the month. If fertilizing your plants, this could be done perhaps once in the month, because the cold would induce dormancy at this time. There still may be some plants that, because of their genetic inheritance, show signs of new growth with the appearance of new roots at this time. If any of these are spotted and they need potting on or repotting, this should be done now, as if left for later they may not form new roots once again. Protect buds and flower sheaths and keep a constant look out for snails and slugs and bait for them.

Keep an eye out for plants in the shadehouse that have spent flowers. Spent flowers and flower sheaths should be removed with scissors or secateurs that are sterilised before use on each plant. At this time of year in particular, water that collects in old flower sheaths and stagnates can lead to rot that will result in loss of the pseudobulb.

#### PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURAL NOTES (JULY/AUGUST 2018) by Trevor Burnett

These are the truly wonderful months, and most rewarding for the Paphiopedilum growers, especially of the exhibition type clones. We should be flush with flowers with some of our old favourites flowering again, and some new seedlings we have been eagerly awaiting to flower for several years, finally producing flowers. In many cases for new seedlings, we experience disappointment or indeed sheer joy, at the quality of the flowers. My watering programme is still at 14 day intervals, but I may give additional watering if the weather is fine and sunny for 6-8 days in a row. With the flowers now fully in bloom, it is time to re-assess your collection and decide what plants you are going to keep or dispose of as surplus. It is also a good time to work out whether you are short on any particular colour or types, so you can purchase new divisions or seedlings from other growers who are disposing of surplus divisions. I still will give the flowering plants fertilizer on a fortnightly or monthly basis. The smaller, un-flowered plants will still require fertilizer at one-quarter to one-half strength, on a fortnightly or monthly basis, to keep the growth moving forward. Flowers can be left on 2-3 growth plants without harm, as long as the plants are healthy and showing good, strong growths. With smaller plants flowering for the first time on a single growth, not showing signs of a secondary growth, the guick removal of the flowers will facilitate the best growth. This will promote new growths and ensure strong growth and flowers in future years. The flower can be enjoyed as a cut flower for some time.

#### CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (JULY/AUGUST 2018) based on notes from Roy Brown

The most important job with our Cymbidiums for the next month will be caring for the flower spikes, training those that need straightening up and seeing that they receive the proper shade conditions to bring out the best colour in the blooms. During July the flower spikes grow rapidly and soon the majority of the flower buds will be visible. August will see the spikes lengthen further, and the flower buds space themselves out on the stem in readiness for flowering. It's from this stage onwards that they have to be watched carefully. Heavy rain or hail can spoil your flower buds, so the plant will need to be moved into the flowering section where a close watch can be kept on the progress of the spikes. Also watch that the wind doesn't cause the plant's leaves to knock or rub against the flower buds. This quite often happens and a small mark on a bud at this stage will show up as a bad blemish on the flower sepals when the bud opens. Plants that are under cover for protection should be watered regularly. If they are allowed to dry out you'll run the risk of bud drop. Finally this month, make sure you have sufficient flower pots and a good supply of mix on hand in readiness for the repotting jobs that can be started after the end of next month.

#### From our June General Meeting...

#### John Carless — Dry Rest for Orchids

Generally, most orchids don't like cold wet winters, especially when temperatures fall below 8 °C for long periods of time. When this occurs, plants should be kept on the dry side. It is important to remember that more orchids are killed by overwatering than underwatering. If you are not sure whether to water or not, it is probably better not to water.

Everybody's growing conditions are different. Each grower should take into account temperature, humidity, light, potting media, drainage, and air circulation. During winter in Perth, watering is only needed every 7 - 10 days, even in glasshouses. Plants in shadehouses should receive sufficient water from rainfall. Plants grown on slabs (i.e., mounted) will require water more often. Damping down floors will increase humidity in growing areas. Watering at this time of year should be done mid-morning on a sunny day, and plants should be dry by nightfall.

Any repotting and/or fertilizing should be left until at least mid-August or early September. Scale insects can be a problem at this time. Small infestations can be brushed off with methylated spirits mixed with water.

Some orchids that require a dry rest in winder: Dendrobiums (*Dendrobium fameri, Dendrobium thrysiflorum, Dendrobium loddigessii, Dendrobium nobile, Dendrobium canaliculatum*), oncidiums and their relatives, stanhopeas, ansellias.

#### Courtney Rogasch — Dividing a large orchid

Courtney showed off a large specimen of *Laelia lobata* that had seriously outgrown its pot and had many pseudobulbs with long roots well outside the pot. The pot was about a 15 cm pot but the pseudobulbs occupied formed a cluster about 60 cm in diameter. Courtney used a large knife to cut the rhizome and divide the plant into pieces of about three to five pseudobulbs each. He was quite rough during this procedure. Lynn assisted by painting Mercurochrome onto the cut sections of the divisions, to seal the wounds and prevent attack by fungus or other pathogens. Mercurochrome is much easier to apply than Steriprune (which tends to get everywhere.) Courtney advised that *Laelia lobata* is an orchid that often flowers best when it overgrows the pot. He suggested growing the divisions in coarse bark in slatted pots (e.g., the shallow square Vanda pots), or on mounts, and recommended pieces with four or five pseudobulbs as being a good size. He then generously gave away all the divisions, and promised that he would give a decent orchid to whomever was the first person to bring a piece in flower back to a general meeting. There were many witnesses who heard this pronouncement, and after brief discussion Courtney emphasized that *only the first* person with a flowering division would earn the decent orchid prize.

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When Courtney was almost finished dividing the plant, he discovered an aluminium stake tangled within the remnants of the plant. He recalled that he made the stake from an offcut of 72-strand cable he obtained from some Western Power workers in his area. To make the stake, he cut the cable to the length he wanted, and separated the individual strands. At this point, the strands were aluminium wires that were each curled into a loose helical shape. To straighten a strand, he bent the last two cenitmetres of one end to form a loop, and fixed that firmly into a vice, then poked the other end into a drill chuck and tightened the chuck firmly. He then turned the drill on and pulled back away from the vice. As the drill chuck turned, the wire was straightened. [Of course this exercise requires great care! Protective eyewear, clear work area away from trip hazards, slow drill speed, etc, etc.] The loop part serves two purposes. Firstly, it makes fixing the wire into the vice easier. Secondly, later when the wire is being used as a stake in an orchid pot, the loop prevents people looking closely at the orchid from being poked in the eye with an aluminium spike. The aluminium wire is very versatile. It can be used straight, to stake a tall cymbidium, or it can easily be bent and formed into a gentle curve to follow an arching phalaenopsis raceme. Courtney may talk about this more during his presentation in the July meeting.

**Helen Stretch**: *Wilsonara* Eye Candy 'Pinky'. Helen purchased this plant from Tinonee Orchid Nursery at the WAOS meeting in August 2017. She now has it in a 15 cm anti-spiral pot (a pot with vertical undulations in the sides to stop the roots spiralling around inside) that has large vertical slots. Because the pot has the large slots, Helen uses a mix of cocopeat, small bark, and perlite to retain moisture. The pot had been hanging in the shadehouse exposed to rain until flowering about two weeks ago. Fertilising is with Strike Back (pellets and liquid) and various foliar feeds. The plant has grown very fast. It was only about 5 cm tall when purchased last August, but has now filled its 15 cm pot and the foliage is about 30 cm tall, a testament to Helen's skills at orchid culture.

**Harry Ashton**: *Tolumnia* 169. This plant was a polypack plant from Bunnings. Harry is growing it mounted on cork with a bit of sphagnum to help keep moisture around the roots. He usually has it hanging in the shadehouse, but now that it is flowering he has brought it under cover out of the rain, and has it hanging on some security mesh. The flowers are intricately patterned with deep red markings, which seem to get darker as the weather gets colder.
