Packing Up at General Meetings

One of the conditions of OSWA using the meeting facilities at the Manning Senior Citizen's Activity Centre is that we leave the centre as neat and tidy as we found it. If you aren't in a rush to get home at the end of a general meeting, please assist with moving tables and chairs back into place after the meeting.

Trailer Towing

We occasionally need to transport props for Shows and Displays by trailer. Richard and Merril are our regular trailer towing crew, but they are sometimes unavailable for the task. The trailer towing person only needs to tow the trailer, usually only for short trips. Other members are always available to do the packing and unpacking of the trailer.

CATTLEYA CULTURAL NOTES (OCTOBER/NOVEMBER) - based on notes from Henry Eaton.

Now that the shows are over for this year, we will be getting into the season for assessing the needs of our plants to be repotted or potted on. This is the start of the growing season and getting the plants off to a good start will result in better flowering next year.

Plants that will need to be considered for potting will be:

- (a) seedlings that have been more than six months in the pot;
- (b) plants where the front growth is over the edge of the pot, or where the next growth will take it;
- (c) plants showing signs of being unhappy in their current mix;
- (d) plants that need breaking up because of their large size.

When to pot can be largely influenced by the appearance of new roots. When new roots appear, you can be sure they will establish in new mix quite readily. Do not allow new roots to grow more than 2-3 centimetres long before potting as longer roots are more likely to get broken in the process of potting.

When potting on, choose a pot size one step up from the pot you had used till then, e.g., from a 125 mm to a 150 mm pot. The mix you use should fit in with your schedule for having time to water your plants. The coarser the mix, the more frequent the watering will have to be.

At the time of potting place the oldest pseudo bulb against the back wall of the pot and fill in with mix from the front. Push the mix in so that the plant is held firm in the pot. If adequately immobilised, you can usually lift the plant up by its leaves without the plant coming away from the pot. Stake the pseudo bulbs up vertically as far as possible and make sure the front growth cannot move around damaging the emerging new roots.

Place the repotted plant in a shady spot in your growing area for a couple of weeks to counter the shock of replanting. Something like a seaweed solution watered through would also help counter shock. If there is a need to divide a plant, make sure you use a sterilised cutting instrument and do not make a division smaller than 3-4 healthy bulbs.

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PAPHIOPEDILUM CULTURAL NOTES (OCTOBER/NOVEMBER) by Trevor Burnett

This month is about getting our newly potted plants into full growth as the growths will need to mature in order to produce flowers next year. With the warmer weather, the fertilizer programme can be increased to weekly or fortnightly at $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ strength, with a high nitrogen based fertilizer to promote good development of the new growths.

In our repotting process we usually end up with plants being repotted into larger pots or divided into several pieces, so be very mindful not to cram your plants together like sardines. They still need space between plants for good air movement. If we cram plants together, we provide a wonderful place for all sorts of bugs to hide and also restrict the airflow around plants. Good air movement around the plants is essential for good healthy plants and greatly reduces the problems of disease.

In respect to watering, we must ensure that our plants do not become completely dry, as we have a nice new mix which for the first couple of months will tend to dry out quicker than the old mix we have just replaced. At this time of the year I would water at 7 day intervals, unless the temperature goes above 32 °C for three consecutive days, then I would bring back my watering to every 4 days.

It is also an ideal time to see if that plant you admired from one of the growers has been divided and a piece may be available to purchase. Remember this is the ideal time to reflect on your cultural success and sharing your growing success with friends and club members. Good luck and good growing for the summer months ahead.

CYMBIDIUM CULTURAL NOTES (OCTOBER/NOVEMBER) - based on notes from Roy Brown

Repotting should be in full swing, but by the middle of November the temperature will be fairly high, so it would be advisable to have all the repotting done by the first week of November at the latest. When dividing your plants, try not to break them up into sections that are too small. A three bulb piece will have a better chance of flowering the following year. Try not to overpot your plant. Select a pot that will hold the plant and its root system and will allow for a further two years growth.

When repotting, hold the plant firmly in one hand one inch below the top of the pot, then using your fingers work the fresh pine bark between the plants roots. Fill the pot to about a centimetre from the rim, firming the bark in as you go. The plant should now be sitting neatly in the centre of the pot, with the base of the bulb just below the top of the bark.

Give the plant a good watering and place it in a cool, shady position for about a week, until the roots start into active growth again.

When the flower spikes have been cut and the plant repotted, you will find the new season's leads will shoot ahead. Keep them growing strongly by increasing the fertilizing to weekly or fortnightly intervals. In the growing season, Cymbidiums love plenty of light, water and a regular feeding programme.

From our September meeting

Lynn Brooks - Pleione Orchids.

Pleiones are ground orchids, native to the region stretching from the Himalayas through to Taiwan. They are characterised by a large flower that develops very quickly off a stem possessing a single leaf, from a fairly large underground bulb. Pleiones need to be treated like a tulip bulb — they need to be stored in fridge so that they experience a cool period. Flower colours range from yellow to white to pink to purple. Pleiones can grow in small bark, peat, or coir. They flower for 3-4 weeks during late August to October, then their leaves grow, and they should be fed and watered well while in growth. When growth stops at the end of summer, lift the bulbs, bag them, and put them in the fridge until about July. Pleiones can be ordered from growers in Victoria, or by the local vendor "Tulips with a difference" (www.wabulbs.com).

Charly Hartmann - Bulbophyllum Orchids

Charly specialises in bulbophyllums and has been growing them for the last few years. He noted that the genus *Bulbophyllum* is the largest orchid genus, with over 2800 valid members in the Kew Gardens list.

Charly demonstrated that bulbophyllums can be fast growers. He showed a specimen of *Bulbophyllum lobii* that he obtained as a seedling from Bunnings in 2015, which had already grown into a large specimen of about 50 bulbs. That plant is already about 30 cm in diameter. He also showed a stunning *Bulbophyllum phalaenopsis* that had huge leaves. One huge leaf had grown to about a metre in length since first appearing at the end of May. The other huge leaf on this plant grew during summer, so under Charly's growing conditions there seems to be little seasonal variation in leaf growth. A third orchid that Charly showed, *Bulbophyllum cheiri*, had achieved 2 metres of rhizome growth in just 2 years.

Charly's growing techniques run counter to the conventional wisdom relied upon by most orchid growers, and he pays fastidious attention to detail. He claims to have no secrets for his success, but

insists that for good growth, relative humidity must be consistently maintained at $75\pm5\%$, and temperature must be consistently maintained at $25\pm8\%$, throughout the year. During a recent trip to see orchids in the wild in Borneo, Charly carried a temperature- and humidity-measuring instrument and verified that these are the conditions that the orchids experience in nature. He has a small hot house fitted with an evaporative air conditioner (controlled by a humidistat), a heater (controlled by a thermostat), and fans, to help maintain humidity and temperature and ensure good air movement. Charly waters only with rainwater at pH 6 to 6.5, adjusting the pH of the rainwater by addition of acid when necessary. He also ensures that the water temperature is 25-30%, and has a kettle set aside especially for heating water on cold mornings when necessary. Interestingly, Charly waters more in winter than in summer, because watering with warm water gets warmth into the plants. He applies these techniques to his paphs and dendrobiums too.

Charly turns the fans in the hothouse off at night, to preserve warmth in the hothouse. The heater blows against the lower internal wall of the hothouse, and from there the heat is dispersed evenly through the hothouse, without plants being scorched by being directly in the "firing line" of the heater.

Charly's growing medium is *only* sphagnum moss. The moss maintains water and allows the plants to drink slowly throughout the day. He notes that if he used bark, he would need to water much more frequently during summer. (I have tried growing plants in pure sphagnum moss. I water sparingly in winter to avoid my plants getting fungal problems, and my sphagnum moss invariably dries out and is difficult to re-wet again. My plants kept in sphagnum moss for long periods eventually die. I think the reason for Charly's success may be his attention to keeping his plants warm, so he can keep the sphagnum moss moist throughout the year, and even in winter the roots of his plants don't get cold and wet and die off.)

Charly fertilizes at least weekly. He uses Strike Back Liquid, calcium nitrate, CALiMAGic 1-0-0, Ezi-Root, Polyfeed, Epsom Salt, Growth Technologies, and Bill's Best Plant Encourager, cycling through the list at a rate of one fertilizer per week. He reasons that if a particular fertilizer is missing some element that his orchids need, that element will be in one of the other fertilizers.

Charly's methods are unorthodox, but his success is obvious. In 2017 Charly's *Bulbophyllum* Krairit Vejvarut 'Gerda' was awarded an FCC, the highest award in the Australian Orchid Council's award system.

Novice: *Cattleya* Orglade's Grand "Yow Chang Beauty", owner Graham Esmond. Graham grows this orchid in a mix of medium bark, charcoal, blue metal, and perlite. Fertilises with Strike Back for Orchids and Nutricote. He does not let the plant dry out, waters twice weekly in summer, fortnightly in winter. He has owned the plant since 2011, split it in April, and it's flowering again already!

Plant discussion: Two highly fragrant orchids: Rhyncholaelia glauca and Dendrochilum cobbianum.


